

#### **MUSIC NOTES**

#### **Organ Music**

Today's organ voluntaries comprise a prelude and fugue pair from Bach's Well-Tempered Clavier, Book 1, a collection that cycles through all 24 major and minor keys. Though intended for use at the harpsichord or clavichord, several of these pieces work well on the organ. The E-minor Prelude survives in a couple of distinct versions, one with plain chords in the right hand against a running left hand and the other with an elaborate obbligato melody in the right hand. WTC 1 includes the latter version of this prelude, which resembles a restless cantata movement. The Fugue, scored for just two voices, seems like a two-part invention though it follows fugal procedure, with the initial subject reappearing regularly on different scale steps. Perhaps its most surprising feature are a couple of passages octaves—a rare occurrence in Bachian counterpoint.

#### **Choral Music**

This morning's **introit** originally formed part of Christopher Tye's *Actes of the Apostles* (1553), composed in simple four-part harmony intended for small ensembles of amateur singers for use in their home devotions. The words for *O Come, Ye Servants of the Lord* are from Psalm 113 and are a later addition to Tye's music, following the now-common practice of substituting other texts in place of the composer's original words.

This morning's **first anthem** is an energetic setting of a startling text by Carl P. Daw, Jr. telling of the "True Anointed One," the Christ, and how Christians must always have a searching faith.

The music is by Houston composer David Ashley White, Professor of Music and former Director of the Moores School of Music at the University of Houston. *True Anointed One* was premiered in 1987 at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Amarillo, Texas for a regional gathering of the Association of Anglican Musicians.

Today's **second** anthem is by Dallas-based organ -ist and composer Richard DeLong, who wrote a large body of profoundly conceived choral works during his all-too-brief but very productive life. DeLong was born in Mansfield, Ohio, on September 17, 1951, and died on September 7, 1994 in Dallas, Texas. As a recitalist he performed across the United States and in Europe. As a composer with works in print among twelve different publishers, he was regularly commissioned to write new ones. For twelve years DeLong was Director of Music at St. Mark the Evangelist Church (RC), in Plano, Texas, a position he held until his death. He was a brilliant choral trainer and conductor, and his own choir sang the premiere performances of nearly 100 of his choral works. A past dean of the Dallas Chapter of the American Guild of Organists (1981 -83), DeLong was an advocate for the performance of new liturgical music. He was also an avid collector of twentieth-century art. His setting of O Lord, Increase Our Faith, heard this morning, was composed in 1985 for Samuel Baker and the choir of the Episcopal Church of the Epiphany in Richardson, Texas.
