



#### **WORSHIP NOTES**

Reformation Day commemorates the beginning of the Protestant Reformation on October 31, 1517, when Martin Luther (1483-1546) posted his 95 points of dispute with the Roman Catholic Church. Today's prayer of confession was written by Luther. The prayer of thanksgiving was written by John Calvin (1509-1564), who established the Reformed (Presbyterian) tradition in Switzerland. Luther and Calvin are two of the three statues outside of our sanctuary. They are joined there by the Scottish reformer John Knox (1513-1572).

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#### **MUSIC NOTES**

Completed around 1731, *Lute Concerto in D Major*, RV 93, is one of four works by Vivaldi that feature the lute—a European ancestor of the modern guitar. Following the standard three-movement fast-slow-fast concerto structure, the lute part primarily consists of chordal arpeggios in various styles, reflecting both the period's musical conventions and the instrument's idiomatic capabilities. Today's **voluntaries** comprise the second and third movements: a reflective and meditative *Largo* over a lightly repeated bass line, and a tarantella-like *Allegro* featuring rapid arpeggios for both soloist and accompaniment.

Though the date of its earliest performance is unknown, J. S. Bach began composing BWV 80 as early as 1723—just five months after moving to Leipzig. As is typical of a chorale cantata, each movement is based on a chorale tune—in this case, Martin Luther's hymn *Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott* ("A Mighty Fortress Is Our God") to commemorate Reformation Day. Our **introit** is the closing movement of the cantata, a four-part setting of Luther's final stanza.

In addition to his musical accomplishments, pastor, musician, and composer Tom Trenney is also known for his kindness, authenticity, and earnestness—traits he attributes to his hero, Fred M. Rogers. Today, the St. Philip children—with a little help from the congregation—present his arrangement of *God Is Here Today*, which was dedicat-

ed to Mr. Rogers after his passing and reflects his enduring legacy: God is love.

Our **anthem** features a creative reimagining of Martin Luther's iconic hymn, incorporating modern harmonies, ambient electric guitar, and the composer's adaptation of the traditional text. Like many of Kyle Pederson's works, this arrangement is not intended to alter or replace a cherished hymn, but rather to honor and preserve its legacy in today's world. By drawing from the deep roots of the Reformation hymn tune and highlighting its continued relevance, Pederson's interpretation offers a fresh and compelling expression for our time.

Brazilian composer Heitor Villa-Lobos—a singular figure in 20th-century music—composed his nine-suite collection *Bachianas Brasileiras* ("Brazilian Bach Pieces") between 1930 and 1945, for various combinations of instruments and voices. Each piece fuses Brazilian folk and popular music with the style of Johann Sebastian Bach, as an effort to adapt Baroque harmonic and contrapuntal techniques to Brazilian idioms. The *Ária* from the fifth suite—perhaps Villa-Lobos' best-known work—was originally written for soprano and eight cellos, but later arranged for solo guitar by the composer himself, who was also a classical guitarist.





