

WORSHIP NOTES

Reformation Day commemorates the beginning of the Protestant Reformation on October 31, 1517, when Martin Luther (1483-1546) posted his 95 points of dispute with the Roman Catholic Church. Today's prayer of confession was written by Luther.

Today's lectionary readings:

- Deuteronomy 6:1-9 Hear, O Israel: The Lord alone is our God; you shall love the Lord.
- Psalm 119:1-8 Happy are those who seek God and walk in the ways of the Lord.
- Hebrews 9:11–14 By the blood of Christ, our high priest, we will be made clean.
- Mark 12:28–34 Jesus summarizes the commandments: to love God and neighbor.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's **opening voluntary** consists of a set of variations on one of the Reformation's first truly popular songs: "All Glory Be To God on High" is Luther's versification of the Latin "Gloria in Excelsis," as set to a melody by Nikolaus Decius. Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck, longtime organist of the Oude Kerk in Amsterdam (from 1577-1621), composed and improvised regularly on Dutch psalm tunes and on German chorale melodies, the two principal musical genres of the Calvinist and German Reformations, respectively. In this set of variations, he takes advantage of the dance-like meter of the chorale melody while using the tune from variation to variation in different parts of the texture.

As our **closing voluntary**, Sebastian Bach's Chorale Fantasie on "Ein feste Burg" dates from fairly early in his career as an organ virtuoso. A youthful desire to impress and to please is evident in the various ways he treats Luther's sturdy hymn melody: first as a piece of two-part counterpoint, then with steadily fuller textures until the tune appears in long notes in the pedal just before the end.

Handbell Music

This morning's bell **introit** is a brief hymn-tune arrangement by Indianapolis-based composer Jason Krug, who has written over 400 handbell compositions, as well as other works for piano, organ, choir, and string orchestra. Krug's setting of *Shall We Gather at the River* is written for a small handbell ensemble of just six ringers.

Choral Music

Today's **first anthem** is by American composer and conductor Z. Randall Stroope, whose composition teachers included Cecil Effinger and Normand Lockwood, both students of the renowned French teacher/composer Nadia Boulanger, who was herself a student of Gabriel Fauré. Published in 2010, *All Who Dwell in the Shadow of the Lord* was written for SATB choir and piano (or organ), and features a text by the composer inspired by the words of Psalms 90 and 91.

This morning's second anthem is by American composer Fred Gramann, who has been music director and organist at The American Church in Paris, France since 1976. A native of Washington state, he earned organ performance degrees at Syracuse University and the University of Michigan, followed by studies in Paris with Marie -Claire Alain and Maurice Duruflé. Gramann has numerous choral and handbell works published in the United States and is the Honorary Associate Director of the Raleigh Ringers of North Carolina as well as the Embellish Handbell Ensemble of Grand Rapids, Michigan. He is the newly appointed director for the Bay View Week of Handbells, Bay View, Michigan, and continues to be the permanent director for Bronzefest and UK Bronze. Published in 2018, With This Water is a gentle, lyrical anthem for SATB voices with words by the composer, perfect for today's celebration of the sacrament of baptism here at St. Philip.



In a pairing that began in 1561, this paraphrase of Psalm 100 by a Scot is set to a tune that a French composer originally created for Psalm 134 in the Genevan Psalter of 1551. They have appeared together in nearly every comprehensive English-language hymnal since then.

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This hymn addressed to a newly-baptized child begins each stanza with a facet of the child's identity, culminating in "child of God." By being directed to one person rather than the whole congregation, this text occupies a special category among the "songs of encouragement."
