



WORSHIP NOTES

Reign of Christ is the final Sunday of the church year. This day centers us on the crucified and risen Christ, whom God has exalted to rule over the whole universe. The celebration of the lordship of Christ looks back to Ascension, Easter, and Transfiguration, and points ahead to the appearing in glory of the King of kings and Lord of lords. (*The Companion to the Book of Common Worship*). As the season of Advent begins next Sunday, so also begins a new church year and a new year in the lectionary calendar.

Today's readings and prayers are borrowed from various sources such as:

- Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24 I will be the shepherd of my sheep, says the Lord; I will save them.
- Psalm 100 Make a joyful noise to the Lord; we are the sheep of God's pasture.
- Psalm 95:1-7a The Lord is our God, and we are the people of God's pasture.
- Ephesians 1:15-23 Christ is seated at God's right hand; all powers are under his feet.
- Matthew 25:31-46 The king will judge: just as you did it to the least, you did it to me.

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MUSIC NOTES

This morning's **opening voluntary**, played by Bell Canto, was arranged by Dan R. Edwards, whose works include over 300 pieces for adults and children's choirs, handbells, and small instrumental ensembles. Its melodic material is drawn from the hymn tune HYFRYDOL, which appears in our *Glory to God* hymnal at No. 366 ("Love Divine, All Love's Excelling") and 260 ("Alleluia, Sing to Jesus"). Staccato bass bells add a spark to this lively setting, which creatively reharmonizes the original melody into a very energetic piece!

Both **choral anthems** were composed during the English Renaissance. Organist Christopher Tye served in his native Cambridge and at Ely Cathedral before a short period at court, as music master to Edward VI. His English-language church music shows an affinity for both counterpoint and concision, with imitative ideas carefully wedded to individual phrases of text. Adrian Batten, who held positions at Westminster Abbey then St Paul's Cathedral in London, was also an accomplished composer of Anglican anthems. His setting of Psalm 81:1–4 ("O Sing Joyfully") plays with particular words and phrases to create memorable pictures in sound. J. S. Bach himself first published our **Offertory** as part of *Six Chorales of Various Kinds* (1748). This collection, known colloquially as the "Schübler Chorales" after his longtime engraver, comprises organ transcriptions from the composer's own cantatas. The original version of *Kommst du nun, Jesu, von Himmel herunter* ("Come, Lord Jesus, from Heaven to Earth") combines a solo alto chorale against a sparkling violin obbligato—a texture that adapts beautifully to the organ, where three busy contrapuntal lines can be realized effectively by two hands and two feet.

A closely related German chorale tune animates Helmut Walcha's *Lobt Gott den Herrn, ihr Heiden all* ("Praise the Lord, All Ye People"), this morning's **Closing Voluntary.** This contemporary chorale fantasy begins with the hymn melody in the soprano before it migrates to the pedal, around which imitative voices dance and play.



MONDAYS IN ADVENT-LECTIO DIVINA ON **ZOOM – December 4, 11, and 18** at 9:00-9:20 a.m. – What is Lectio Divina? The ancient desert fathers and mothers believed that scripture was like a love letter written to us by God. Thus, the meditative, guided scriptural reflection known as Lectio Divina ("divine reading") assumes that God speaks to us intimately, God is already praying in us, and we'll experience a profound encounter with the heart of God, rather than an intellectual study of scripture.
