

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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Today's **opening voluntary** on REJOICE, REJOICE takes the tune of our opening hymn (No. 107) on a highly rhythmic and colorful ride. Its composer, American organist and composer Aaron David Miller, is also one of the finest improvisers of his generation. Written for the 2016 National Convention of the American Guild of Organists here in Houston, this piece was subsequently published in the *Bayoubüchlein*, a collection of hymn-based organ works commissioned for that event.

Bach's sprightly setting of the chorale *Nun freut euch, lieben Christen g'mein* ("Dear Christians, One and All, Rejoice") gets to the heart of this seasonal hymn text, which encourages the faithful to celebrate Christ's incarnation, birth, and ministry on earth. Cast as a trio, with the chorale melody in long notes in the tenor register (as played by the feet), the outer lines supply a busy obbligato in the right hand and a classic "walking bass" in the left.

Handbell Music

With roots reaching as far back as the fourteenth century, the hymn tune BEREDEN VÄG FÖR HERRAN is based on a Scandanavian folk melody. The hymn, a verse of which we sing as one of our responses this morning, is by Finnish poet and priest Frans Mikael Franzen (1772–1847), and draws much of its inspiration from Isaiah 40. Structured as one long crescendo, today's handbell introit is a 2007 setting by Derek Hakes of *Prepare the Way, O Zion* that enhances the strength and vitality of this original tune, contrasting between sections of flowing eighth note treble accompaniment and chordal writing.

Music during this morning's **offertory** features a setting for handbells of the lively French Advent carol BESANÇON. Jason Krug's 2015 arrangement of *People, Look East* makes use of the original carol's repeated-note figures and swinging 6/8 meter in a framework of joyful Advent expectation.

Choral Music

Today's anonymous 16th-century **anthem** *Rejoice in the Lord Alway* (formerly attributed to John Redford) is a beloved choral setting of words from this morning's first reading. The only known source for this anthem is in the Mulliner Book, a historically important manuscript compiled between about 1545 and 1570, and now held in the British Museum. The lively music of *Rejoice in the Lord Alway* typifies the concise, syllabic style of the earliest English anthems, and its text is taken from the Great Bible of 1540, prepared by Myles Coverdale and authorized by King Henry VIII.

This morning's **second anthem** is a beautiful work for unaccompanied SATB voices by Canadian composer Mark Sirett, who is a conductor, organist, pianist, and founding Artistic Director (since 1996) of the award-winning Cantabile Choirs of Kingston, Ontario. Sirett is also the former organist and music director of St. George's Cathedral (Anglican Church of Canada) in Kingston. *Thou Shalt Know Him When He Comes* was written for the cathedral choir in 2002, and it remains the most widely-sung setting of this moving anonymous text.

After attending a carol concert, the author and composer of this hymn was moved to create a contemporary, accessible carol that drew on the familiar images in a new way. There are echoes here of passages such as Isaiah 9:6, Isaiah 7:14/Matthew 1:23, Isaiah 35:5–6, Isaiah 2:4.



This hymn shows how once-unconnected parts can work together. The text about John the Baptist was written in Latin in the 18th century and translated into English in the 19th century. Similarly, the 17th-century melody was adapted to its present form in the 19th century.

This hymn by a 19th-century Scottish pastor is specifically based on Revelation 1:7 and 22:20, with allusions to several other New Testament passages. Unlike medieval hymns that focused on judgment, this text understands the Second Coming as an occasion of triumph and joy.
