ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING

The Session has called the annual meeting of the congregation for **February 13**, immediately following the 11:00 a.m. worship service. Members may attend the meeting in-person or online. The agenda for the meeting includes review of the 2021 annual report, presentation of the approved 2022 budget, action on the pastors' terms of calls, election of a trustee, and election of members of the congregational nominating committee. David Castle will be nominated to serve a three-year term as trustee. Lee Ardell, Chuck Johnson, and Jeanette Wennenweser will be nominated to serve two-year terms on the congregational nominating nominating committee. Additional nominations may be made at the meeting with prior consent of those being nominated.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

This morning's organ selections are inspired by today's scripture reading: Isaiah 6:1-8 quotes the text that eventually became the Sanctus of the mass and our communion service. Surrounding that familiar "Holy, Holy, Holy," are pieces drawn from an organ mass by Nicolas de Grigny, organist at Reims Cathedral during the years surrounding 1700. The first of the two items that comprise the opening voluntary announces a Kyrie plainchant en taille (in the tenor voice) while four additional voices add chordal solemnity and occasional decorative flourishes. Its companion work from the Kyrie portion of this mass is a trio that alternates (or "dialogues") between two solo voices: the Cornet and the Cromorne. Grigny directed the Dialogue on the Flutes, today's offertory, to be played at the Elevation of the Host, hence the mystery within its the tender interplay of flute stops. The closing voluntary, the final portion of the Agnus Dei ("Lamb of God") from Grigny's mass, is a dialogue in two senses of the word: it juxtaposes the petit jeu (a small reed combination) against the grand jeux (the louder ones) while offering additional echo effects at the end.

Choral Music

This morning's **introit** is by English composer, conductor and organist Eric Thiman, who published some 1,300 works during his lifetime, including many anthems, carols and canticles for church choirs. Much of Thiman's choral and organ music was written for Nonconformist (i.e., non-Anglican) churches, and Thiman himself was a Congregationalist by birth. His setting of *I Was Glad* is No. 7 of 24 *Introits*, published in 1961. Like much of his music, it shows a particularly strong affinity for traditional harmony used to striking and new effect. Thiman was a master of shortform pieces, as evidenced here in just 17 measures of music for four-part choir and organ.

Heard between this morning's scripture reading and sermon, the Latin motet Locus iste was composed by Anton Bruckner in 1869 for the dedication of a chapel at the New Cathedral (constructed between 1862 and 1924) in Linz, Austria. Written for unaccompanied SATB voices, the motet takes its text from a traditional prayer for the anniversary of a church's dedication. Locus iste was the first motet Bruckner composed in Vienna, having accepted a teaching position at the Vienna Conservatory the previous year. It was during this time that Bruckner concentrated most of his creative energy on composing symphonies. Unlike his romantic symphonic works, Bruckner's choral works are often more conservative and contrapuntal in style. A deeply religious man, and a renowned organist, Bruckner composed about 40 motets in addition to masses and other sacred choral works. Locus iste is perhaps the best-known and most-performed of the motets, and in keeping with its original liturgical purpose, it has been suggested that this motet might reflect elements of architecture, such as in the symmetry of its form and the use of motives like building blocks.

Today's communion anthem features a beautiful eucharistic text with words and music by American composer Stephen Caracciolo. Within these walls was commissioned by First Presbyterian Church in Steubenville, Ohio, and published in 1995. Reflective of this morning's scripture passage from Isaiah, its refrain concludes each stanza with "Holy, holy, holy God, all glory. Saints on earth and saints above join to bless the Lord of love." Caracciolo serves as the Artistic Director of the Lancaster Chorale, Central Ohio's premier professional chamber choir, as well as Assistant Professor of Music at the University of Maryland Baltimore County (UMBC), where he teaches voice and conducting in addition to leading the Camerata Chamber Choir.

Speaker for the 25th Annual Duerr Lecture Series will be Rev. Dr. Christopher Edmonston, Pastor and Head of Staff of White Memorial Presbyterian Church in Raleigh, NC. He holds the B.A. degree from Davidson College (History), the M.Div. from Union Presbyterian Seminary, and the D.Min. from Columbia Theological Seminary.

Ordained by Charlotte Presbytery in 1999, Edmonston has served churches in Charlotte, NC, and Tarboro, NC, and since 2011 has served White Memorial Presbyterian in Raleigh, NC. He has served on various boards and committees, including the Board of Directors, Union Presbyterian Seminary, Montreat Conference Center, and the Alumni Board of Davidson College. He served as President of the Board of Directors of *The Presbyterian Outlook*. He has also been active on the National Strategy Team of NEXT Church, a renewal movement within the Presbyterian Church (USA).

In demand as a speaker, preacher, and teacher, Edmonston has presented to National Public Radio, the Montreat Conference Center Authentic Parenting Conference, State of North Carolina Governor's Economic Development Council, and others. Publications include articles in The Presbyterian *Outlook, Walter* Magazine, News and Observer (Raleigh, NC), and Feasting on the Gospels (Westminster John Knox). He has recently had a book published, together with Kim and Penn Holderness: "Everybody Fights: So Why Not Get Better at It?"

In his lectures, "Discovering the Pastoral Christology of Luke," Edmonston will lead a deep exploration of Luke 7. In Luke 7 Jesus expands our understanding of inclusion, attends to deep grief, uses his authority to offer new teachings about long-held beliefs, and gives an example of how we might engage with enemies. In a time rife with division and conflict, the pastoral nature of Jesus gives the gift of a fresh alternative for engagement in the church and the world.

Much of the imagery of this hymn comes from Revelation 4:2–11, which its author, an Anglican bishop, knew as a reading appointed for Trinity Sunday. The tune, written specifically for this text, reinforces the Trinitarian theme by strong dependence on the D-major triad.



The flowering of English hymnody in the 19th century included the rediscovery, translation, and versification of ancient Christian hymns, such as this text from one of the earliest existing Christian liturgies. It is set here to an adaptation of a 17th-century French melody.

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The opening line of this hymn was inspired by the three divine attributes listed in 1 Timothy 1:17 (King James Version), and it continues by considering how God's life exceeds our own finite existence. The text is well set to a Welsh melody shaped by many three-note units.
