





Kimberly Marshall Organ Recital - TODAY

LENTEN LECTIO DIVINA PRAYER GROUP – The ancient desert mystics believed that scripture was like a love letter written to us by God, and the meditative scriptural reflection known as *Lectio Divina* ("divine reading") assumes that God speaks to us intimately, God is already praying in us, and we'll experience a profound encounter with the heart of God, rather than an intellectual study of scripture. Keatan is guiding a group through the four cycles of Lectio (read, reflect, respond, rest) every Monday morning at 9:00-9:20 a.m. for the season of Lent. MUSICAL MEDITATION AT ST. PHILIP—As part of our Holy Week calendar, St. Philip Presbyterian will be hosting an afternoon "Musical Meditation" on Holy Saturday, Mar. 30 at 5 p.m. This year's theme is "Godly Sorrow" (with reference to 2 Corinthians 7:10) featuring soprano Julia Fox and violist Yvonne Smith, alongside St. Philip organist, Matthew Dirst. Major works will include "Miroir de peine" by Henrik Andriessen for soprano and organ, Hindemith's "Trauermusik" for viola and organ, music from BWV 18 by Bach, and other selections. A free-will offering will be taken.

MUSIC NOTES

Wondrous Love, one of the best-known of shape-note hymn melodies, inspired today's **opening** and **communion organ voluntaries**. Invented in England, the practice of shape-note singing refers to musical notation that uses various shapes for the notes of the solfege system. Choral and congregational music notated in this manner include dozens of 19th-century songbooks and hymnals, including *Southern Harmony*, the best-known shape-note source still in use.

The American composer Samuel Barber wrote just a few works for the organ. Among them is a set of variations on *Wondrous Love* (from 1949) that moves through various kinds of figuration, mood, and key schemes. Taking up the same tune decades later, Boston composer and composer Daniel Pinkham treated it to a concise series of variations that explore different textures and colors of the organ.

English composer Herbert Howells occupies a firm place in liturgical choral music, especially in the realm of the pipe organ. Son of a Baptist organist, Howells himself played the organ and sang as a choir boy in the local Church of England starting at age eleven. His works, including today's **introit**, contain unmistakable characteristics from his two biggest influences, fellow Englishmen Ralph Vaughan Williams and Tudor composers like Thomas Tallis and William Byrd.

American composer, arranger, and choral conductor Greg Gilpin has a reputation for producing exciting, versatile, and accessible music that demonstrates a blend of musical styles. Today's **anthem** is cut from the same cloth as many traditional spirituals, such as a poignant text, a catchy tune, and a rhythmic intensity that builds incessantly to a climactic finish.

The words of prolific Harlem Renaissance figurehead Langston Hughes are pervasive throughout modern American society and frequently received musical treatments by a wide range of composers. In 1987, composer and pianist John Musto published his art song cycle "Shadow of the Blues," featuring the settings of four Langston Hughes poems. In today's **offertory**, the second in the collection, Musto paints a desolate musical landscape as the background for Hughes' text, which acts as both a despondent soliloquy and as a call to action.

Our **closing voluntary** is an organ arrangement of a choral setting of today's appointed psalm, whose text has inspired several famous choral works, including Haydn's "The Heavens Are Telling." A Venetian patrician and lawyer, Benedetto Marcello also excelled in musical composition. His fifty psalm settings, published between 1724 -27, feature melodies from both Christian and Jewish traditions. They quickly became popular outside his native orbit, thanks to subsequent English-language editions.
