

God of grace, help us to admit our sin, so that as you come to us in mercy, we may repent, turn to you, and receive forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our redeemer.



WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Luke 19:28-40 Jesus enters Jerusalem on a colt; the disciples praise God with joy.
- Psalm 118:1-2, 19-29 Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.
- Isaiah 50:4-9a The Lord God helps me; who will declare me guilty?
- Psalm 31:9-16 Be gracious, Lord; my enemies assail me; my life is in your hand.
- Philippians 2:5-11 Seek the mind of Christ, who was humble, but exalted by God.
- Luke 22:14 23:56 After the Passover meal, Jesus is betrayed, tried, and crucified.
- Luke 23:1-49 Jesus is tried and crucified.

MUSIC NOTES

Welsh composer Wiliam Mathias was for many years one of the leading lights of British church music. His compositions include numerous anthems sung by the St. Philip Choir over the years. Among his organ works is a "Carillon,' today's **opening voluntary**, which evokes a grand procession. Its varying textures, from gentle tintinnabulations to clangorous ostinatos, also recall the sounds of church bells.

On Palm Sunday, we commemorate Jesus' triumphant ride into Jerusalem, but today our children's music presents a song centering on an unsung hero of that day: the donkey who carried him. Through repeated musical elements and a distinct minor mode, the children teach us the story of Palm Sunday from a new and unique perspective.

The Norwegian composer Ola Gjeilo has created a name for himself in modern choral music through his broadly appealing modern tonal style that paints vivid landscapes of color and texture. Based on the final movement of his *Sunrise Mass*, today's **anthem** conveys Gjeilo's vision of what he calls a "grounded" sense of harmony and peace after a long emotional journey. As Holy Week begins and the conclusion of the Lenten journey draws near, may we also find peace and grounding through his music. Although not intended for passiontide, this morning's **offertory** from Bach's 1724 cantata *Aus tiefer Not schrei ich zu dir* ("Out of deep anguish I call to You"), BWV 38 poignantly encapsulates the current point in our journey from darkness (Lent) to light (Easter). The musical material in the movement mirrors the contrasting themes found in the text, evoking despair through descending motion, such as the descending sequence of fifths in the opening ritornello, and salvation through ascending motion like the short upward melodic passages that appear throughout the texture. A relatively rare trio aria in Bach's cantata cycles, the movement is comparable to a similar trio found in a cantata written just three weeks earlier on similar text.

At the **closing voluntary**, an excerpt from Bach's chorale partita on "Sei gegrüßet, Jesu gütig" ("Be Welcomed, Dearest Jesus") presents this chorale melody unadorned and at the top of the texture. The chorale's text welcomes Jesus but within a Palm/Passion Sunday context: as the sacrificial lamb.


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These stanzas for Palm Sunday have been selected and translated from a much longer Latin poem written by a bishop who was the leading theologian in Charlemagne's court. They are sung to a 17th-century German chorale, as adapted for these words in the mid-19th century.

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Guitar chords do not correspond with keyboard harmony.

This text centers on three significant people in Christ's earthly life, Mary his mother, John the beloved disciple, and Mary Magdalene, the first witness to his Resurrection. With these models to guide us, we can learn much about how to live out our desire to be near to Christ.

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Reducing a twenty-three-stanza Latin text to these five English stanzas intensifies this survey of the mystery of the Incarnation and strengthens the repeated reminder that all was done "for us." A comparable tone of proclamation animates this 15th-century song celebrating a military victory.
