WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Acts 8:26-40 Philip meets an Ethiopian eunuch, who asks to be baptized.
- Psalm 22:25–31 In the great congregation I will praise the Lord, my deliverer.
- 1 John 4:7-21 Let us love one another; we love because God first loved us.
- John 15:1-8 Jesus says: I am the vine, you are the branches; abide in me.

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the <u>saintphilip.net</u> homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with *Negro Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

MUSIC NOTES

Today's **opening voluntary** is one of the few surviving works of Nikolaus Bruhns, one of the most important North German organists of the generation preceding Johann Sebastian Bach. A student of Dietrich Buxtehude, Bruhns left a small number of vocal and organ pieces in the North German "fantastic style," which mixes rhetorically-inspired rhapsodic passages with discrete fugal sections. One of Buxtehude's several settings of the German chorale *Nun lob, mein Seel, den Herren* ("Now Praise, my Soul, the Lord") serves as our **closing voluntary**. Its lively figuration and long-note delivery of the hymn tune in the pedal nicely elucidates a beloved hymn text full of gratitude for life's many blessings.

Both today's **introit** and **anthem** have roots in traditional spiritual music in the 19th century and have unclear origins and have undergone many evolutions in music and text to reach the versions we know today. The first is an arrangement of the timeless Shaker melody, "Simple Gifts," presented here in a lively rendition by our handbell choir. The tune became widely known when Aaron Copland included it as part of his score for the ballet *Appalachian Spring* in 1944, though the music and text are

originally attributed to Elder Joseph Brackett in 1848. "Down in the River to Pray," likely composed around the same time as "Simple Gifts," was first published in the collection *Slave Songs of the United States* in 1867, and like many other slave songs, it has a coded meaning. The use of the phrase "down *in* the river," rather than its common replacement "down *to* the river," not only evokes the imagery of a full-immersion baptism, but also the reality that enslaved people escaping captivity would walk *in* the river to hide their scent from hunting dogs. Similarly, the phrases "starry crown" and "Good Lord, show me the way" refer to navigating by starlight and a prayer for God to guide them towards the escape route.

Although Handel's "Messiah" perhaps receives a majority of its attention in the Christmas season, two of its three parts are a complete depiction of Christ's death and resurrection. Our **offertory**, an air (English equivalent of an *aria*) taken from the third of the oratorio's three parts, sets text from Romans as part of a musical declamation of Christ's final conquest of sin.

Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering

A special offering for the Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering is being collected today. You can make a donation online and choose PW Birthday or use the envelopes found in the Narthex and Gathering Area.

Since 1922, this offering has helped fund mission projects that improve lives. Each year, the Presbyterian Women's Birthday Offering awards grants. Primarily making possible capital improvement projects, the Birthday Offering supports domestic and international ministries, focusing on areas such as agricultural development, child care, community organization, criminal justice, drug counseling, economic justice, elderly care, employment training, homelessness, literacy, violence or women's concerns. Your gift to the Birthday Offering helps fund real solutions in the areas of health, education, economic development and the needs of women and children.

This year's Birthday Offering recipients:

Advocates for Community Choice dba Bethel Hills Villa 5 Apartments and Recreation Area Marthasville, Missouri – Many adults with intellectual/developmental disabilities (I/DD) experience difficulties finding appropriate and affordable housing and often struggle to make friends and thrive in the wider community. Many are placed in nursing homes, boarding homes, with aging parents or in other environments that are expensive and isolating. Bethel Hills addresses the unique needs of individuals with I/DD by providing a safe and loving place that takes into consideration their physical, emotional and spiritual needs in an environment where they can flourish. By renovating a villa into four accessible apartments for eight individuals, this project will provide housing that takes into consideration specific needs unique to the residents, such as addressing acute sensitivity to sounds, bright light and certain colors. The new recreational area will offer space for art and music therapy and other leisure activities for people with and without intellectual/developmental disabilities. With the Birthday Offering grant, Bethel Hills will expand its mission to provide supportive, faith -based, inclusive community where all are accepted and valued.

Shawnee Presbyterian Church Café Gingko Louisville, Kentucky - Shawnee Presbyterian Church serves as a welcoming beacon of light for their community in Louisville. Located in an economically disadvantaged area where single mothers and children face challenges of food insecurity, the church started addressing this need in August 2019. The small yet dedicated congregation began serving free dine-in meals at Café Gingko, named for a ginkgo tree located at the building's north entrance. On average, 30 meals were served at Café Gingko each Monday. In 2020, the pandemic put a stop to the program. At present, the need for healthy food and fellowship continues to grow. With the Birthday Offering grant, Café Gingko will be able to reopen with a renovated kitchen and expanded capacity to provide meals. Improvements to the fellowship hall will allow the church to offer enriching activities: tutoring for elementary ages, Gingko Play Zone, financial literacy classes and Mama-to-Mama parenting workshops. The members of Shawnee Presbyterian Church will reach out and serve their beloved community with resilience and strength – just like the ginkgo tree outside their door.

LOBE DEN HERREN



This very strong 17th-century German hymn employs many phrases from the psalms, especially Psalms 150 and 103:1–6. It did not receive an effective English translation until the mid-19th century, but has remained popular ever since, thanks in part to its stirring tune.
