

#### **WORSHIP NOTES**

Our *Book of Common Worship* offers this explanation of Ascension Sunday: "Near the conclusion of the season of Easter, we commemorate the ascension of the Lord Jesus Christ into heaven. On this day in particular, we give thanks for Christ's sovereign rule over all creation, as well as his priestly intercession for us at the throne of God's mercy. We proclaim with joy that Jesus is already Lord of heaven and earth and head of the Church, and watch with longing for the day when he will come again in the glory of God's new creation."

Today's worship service includes traditional Negro Spiritual music. The Black composers of this music are unknown to history and therefore unable to receive royalties directed to their estates for the use of their songs. To remedy this inequity, a fund has been created and approved by the Session where we will collect voluntary "royalties" for using this music. Anyone may donate to the fund by going to the <u>saintphilip.net</u> homepage and selecting *Make a Contribution*, then selecting Negro Spirituals as the fund. Members can also access this page on the MyStPhilip app (also linked to from the homepage). You may also contribute by writing a check with *Negro Spirituals* in the memo line and placing it in the offering plate or mailing it to the church office. This small gesture of reparation seeks to help heal the long history of injury to Black persons. Contributions received over the course of the year will be donated annually to a local organization supporting Black musical traditions.

#### MUSIC NOTES

This morning's **opening voluntary** comes from one of Olivier Messiaen's most magical works, a 1930s suite on the subject of the Ascension of Christ. "Serene Alleluias" lives up to its name: this is a gently ecstatic variation-style work, yet one that relies on its composer's spiritually infused and highly detailed way of organizing pitches and rhythms. The **closing voluntary** is one of several Bach settings of the German chorale tune *Allein Gott in der Höh sei Ehr* (All Glory Be to God on High). With the lightly decorated melody riding above a sturdy four-part texture, Bach supplies imaginative links between phrases, as he seems to have done during congregational singing throughout his career.

Finlandia, the hymn on which our **introit** is based, was taken from a symphonic poem of the same name by the Finnish composer Jean Sibelius, and represents his patriotism for his native Finland. American poet Lloyd Stone wrote the text to Sibelius' hymn as an international song of peace in 1934, creating a powerful combination of tune and text. *Finlandia* is frequently sung or performed in alternative arrangements, like this one for handbells by Jason Krug.

Today's **anthem** and **offertory** are both creative arrangements inspired by Negro Spirituals, and convenient previews for our Spring Spiritual Celebration concert later today at 5pm. John Rutter's version of "Steal Away," a spiritual believed to have been written by a slave of a Choctaw freedman (formerly enslaved person) in the Indian Territory in the early 1860's, illustrates beautifully the changing text using a variety of textures, including dramatic choral interjections and subtle trumpet calls.

"Kum ba yah," a spiritual with less settled origins, was known to be sung in the Gullah culture in the islands off the coast of South Carolina and Georgia. In this new version composed just a few years ago, Pederson offers a new perspective on the phrase "come by here, Lord" from invitation to declaration, morphing the repeated phrase to "you are here" after a stirring musical climax. The improvisatory nature of the piano accompaniment is also intended to "symbolize the creative movement of God's spirit," according to the composer. We hope you will join us for these and more powerful spirituals later today.


#### PRESBYTERIAN MEN'S WEEKLY FELLOWSHIP-




