#### MUSIC NOTES

The keyboard music of Johann Jakob Froberger, one of the most influential composers of the 17th century, illustrates how this well-traveled and versatile musician infused Germanic counterpoint into the new Italian genres of his day. The opening of his D-minor Toccata, today's **opening voluntary**, conjures a free improvisation, while its subsequent sections continue the serious mood but in an imitative vein. His Toccata in G Major, our **closing voluntary**, likewise combines free fantasy with imitative counterpoint in a work whose overall structure points toward the later "prelude and fugue" format of Bach and others. Froberger published both pieces in his first book of keyboard music from 1656, which comprises toccatas, canzonas, and capriccios in the Italian style.

The prolific Italian composer, organist, and *maestro di cappella* ("chapel master") Giuseppe Ottavio Pitoni made significant contributions to the canon of Baroque choral music, estimated to have penned an astounding 3,500 known compositions, with still other works remaining undiscovered. His *Cantate Domino*, a jubilant setting of Psalm 149:1-2 ("Sing to the Lord a new song"), showcases a mastery of choral style and a reverence for sacred text. Characterized by simple, yet bright harmonies and contrapuntal clarity, this motet invites the congregation into joyful praise, reflecting the timeless call to worship with glad-

ness.

Drawn from *Die Schöpfung* ("The Creation"), Haydn's grand oratorio inspired by the Book of Genesis and the Psalms, today's **anthem** is a powerful declaration of God's majesty revealed in creation. Through his characteristically vibrant choral writing, Haydn gives musical voice to the Psalm 19 text in a contrasting dialogue between the choir and a trio of soloists—representing the day in C major and the night in C minor—in what is one of his most famous and recognizable choruses.

The text for today's **offertory**, beautifully set by J. S. Bach in this solo aria from his Magnificat, is taken from the Virgin Mary's song of praise in the Gospel of Luke. Although most commonly sung or read during Advent today, the Magnificat text was often presented in Latin on high holy days like Easter and Pentecost in Leipzig during Bach's time, and offers a compelling song of praise and gratitude regardless of the season. In what is a relatively brief movement, Bach conveys joy and firmly grounded faith through an unhurried and thoroughly charming melody—yet another earworm from the master.

Because Psalm 117 contains only two verses, Watts's paraphrase had only two stanzas. Most later hymnals have created or borrowed additional stanzas, like the one included here, to enlarge the hymn. Perhaps the best solution is found by adding Alleluias, as this tune invites.


