WORSHIP NOTES

Trinity Sunday celebrates the nature and mission of the triune God—an identity and purpose we share as those who are baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Trinity Sunday is a fitting summation of the first half of the Christian year, as we have remembered the saving promise of God through history in Advent and Christmas, proclaimed the mystery of faith in the crucified and risen Lord in Lent and Easter, and witnessed the transforming work of the Spirit in the world at Pentecost. (From the *Book of Common Worship*, Presbyterian Church, USA)

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Isaiah 6:1-8 Isaiah has a vision of the Lord and cries: Here I am; send me!
- Psalm 29 *In the wilderness and in the temple, give glory to the Lord.*
- Romans 8:12–17 By the Spirit we are children of God and joint heirs with Christ.
- John 3:1–17 We must be born of the Spirit; God sent the Son to save the world.

MUSIC NOTES

In the 1830s and 40s Felix Mendelssohn composed, to great acclaim, two volumes of organ works: three preludes & fugues plus six multi-movement sonatas. His organ recitals in England especially had paved the way for both publications, which shows how well German players preserved the technique of revered virtuoso organists like J. S. Bach. Mendelssohn's **Prelude in G Major** is one of the most tuneful movements from either set, while the **Allegro maestoso from Sonata No. 2** in C minor is a stirring *organo pleno* movement.

The vocal offerings this morning highlight interpretations of the Trinity by composers of three distinct eras and styles. Our introit comes from the setting of a 4th-century Gregorian chant by Saint Ambrose, Bishop of Milan, whose language in the original verses is brought to a fitting point through an added third verse from the turn of the 18th century.

Today's anthem from contemporary composer Howard Helvey, whose output of liturgical music is varied and

prolific, includes both original text and music by the composer. In contrast to the chant text, in which Trinity is not listed explicitly until the final verse, Helvey devotes an entire verse each of the three parts. The homogenous accompaniment, long choral phrases, and unexpected harmonic shifts, characteristic of Helvey's liturgical style, work alongside the text to create a strong sense of unity within the piece itself.

Written in the late-19th century, Fauré's *Requiem* has become a well-known part of liturgical and concert settings alike. When remarking on the work, the composer himself refers to death as an "aspiration towards happiness above, rather than a painful experience." This sentiment comes through in overall character the larger work, and in the *Sanctus* movement, which we offer as today's **offertory**.

PHILIP VOLUNTEER DAY MONDAY, JULY 8—St. Philip mission partner Kids' Meals will host a group from St. Philip on Monday, July 8, from 12:30 - 2:30 p.m., to help prepare sack lunches for children at home during summer vacation. The mission of Kids' Meals is to end childhood hunger by delivering free, healthy meals, year-round to the doorsteps of the greater Houston area's hungriest preschool-aged children and through collaboration provide their families with resources to help end the cycle of poverty. Over the past 17 years, Kids' Meals has provided more than 14 million free, healthy meals to Houston's hungriest children. In 2024, Kids' Meals will make and deliver at least 2.77 million healthy meals, provide healthy produce and groceries at least three times per week, and leverage their daily access to connect children and families with wrap-around services from more than 70 partner service organizations. Kids' Meals cannot reach these goals without volunteers. St. Philip grants support the Healthy Meal Delivery Program. Please save the date to volunteer at Kids' Meals on July 8. KIDS AGAINST HUNGER PLANNING COMMITTEE—This year, many St. Philip members have asked if the Kids Against Hunger meal packing activity will resume. Our church can be a host again for the Kids Against Hunger packing program. There are 5 categories of tasks for a successful Kids Against Hunger program to resume in our church:

- 1. A good accounting/bookkeeping system for orders.
- 2. A good transportation & delivery system of the packing supplies to St. Philip.
- 3. Marketing of the packing program at our church & scheduling volunteer groups.
- 4. Event teams & hosts. A successful church needs 6-8 teams of 4 to 5 people. One team would host about once every six weeks.

Meal deliveries. A delivery team loads up the packed meals on Sunday and delivers Monday mornings to Kids' Meals or another mission partner.

St. Philip needs to form a Kids Against Hunger committee to start this mission program again. The committee members can be any church member; you do not have to already be on the Mission Committee. 

Hymn 1

NICAEA



Much of the imagery of this hymn comes from Revelation 4:2–11, which its author, an Anglican bishop, knew as a reading appointed for Trinity Sunday. The tune, written specifically for this text, reinforces the Trinitarian theme by strong dependence on the D-major triad.



The stanzas here need to be understood as representing the voice of God, while the refrain (based on Isaiah 6:8) is the faithful human response to God's call.

Hymn 8

Eternal Father, Strong to Save





The year after this text was written for a student sailing to America, it was included in the most influential British hymnal of the 19th century. The tune especially composed for it preserves the ancient Roman name of the island where Paul was shipwrecked, now called Malta.
