WORSHIP NOTES

To receive communion today, please come forward via the center aisle, for a piece of bread. The bread may be dipped in the chalice of grape juice and consumed or you may take a small cup of grape juice from the tray. You may return to your pew via the side aisles. Gluten-free bread is available, just ask the servers as you come forward. Those with mobility challenges may receive communion in their seats, just signal the servers. Because the table of Jesus Christ is open to all, everyone is welcome to receive communion today.

An additional offering is received when communion is celebrated. This month's Communion Offering supports St. Philip's Mission Partner **Liberty High School**. Liberty High School is the only high school in our state that offers newly arrived immigrant students who balance full-time work and family responsibilities with earning a high school diploma. The school was established as a response to a need in our community for greater options for young adults to earn a high school diploma. Southwest Houston is considered one of the most diverse communities in the metropolitan area. More than sixty languages are spoken in the surrounding community and a wide range of socio-economic backgrounds are represented. St. Philip was partnered with Liberty High School around 2018 by Loving Houston. The communion offering supports the 73 seniors graduating this May and August 2024 as they prepare to begin college. The graduating seniors are in need of school supplies to being their higher education journey.

Gifts may be brought to the front basket during the final hymn. You may also make a secure contribution through MyStPhilip and choosing the communion fund or by sending a check to the church office, with "Communion" in the memo line.

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Acts 10:44–48 *Gentiles receive the gift of the Spirit; they should be baptized too.*
- Psalm 98 Make a joyful noise to the Lord; give thanks for God's victory.
- 1 John 5:1-6 Trust in Jesus, who came by water and blood, and be born of God.
- John 15:9–17 Jesus says: This is my commandment, that you love one another.

MUSIC NOTES

Today's **organ voluntaries** come from the first of Johann Sebastian Bach's six sonatas for the organ. Bach and his German colleagues adapted the trio texture of Baroque chamber music to the organ by assigning one melody line to each hand and the bass line entirely to the feet. Organ trios thereby became one of the many ways German organists of Bach's generation distinguished themselves from their Italian and French contemporaries, who used the organ pedals far less often. This sonata in three movements comprises an untitled opening movement, for which one assumes a *tempo ordinario*, a central Adagio, and a concluding Allegro. This morning we hear all three movements at various places in the service.

Along with today's gospel reading, both the **introit** and the **anthem** also draw their text from the book of John. First, a setting of text from John chapter 14 by pillar of the High Renaissance, Thomas Tallis, that is emblematic of 16th-century Anglican choral style. Tallis, one of the first musicians to compose sacred music in English rather than

the standard Latin, sets Jesus' words spoken to his disciples foretelling his own death using an English translation of the Bible common during the Reformation. 20th century composer Peter Nardone, a frequent member of the early music vocal ensemble The Tallis Scholars, among others, composed a setting of John 13:34 that combines biblical text with the ancient Gregorian chant *Ubi caritas et amor, Deus ibi est* ("Where charity and love are, God is there").

Our **offertory** is the second of a two-movement composition by California organist and composer, Craig Phillips. Originally written for bassoon and organ, it has been transcribed for horn by our guest hornist today, Connor Landers, and unlike the first movement "Pastorale," which Connor skillfully performed on Palm Sunday, the "Dance" movement features lively rhythms and scalar passages throughout the piece in both organ and horn.


