

WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Ezekiel 17:22–24 The Lord says: I will plant a cedar sprig; it will become a great tree.
- Psalm 92:1-4, 12-15 The righteous are planted in God's house, and grow like a cedar.
- 2 Corinthians 5:6–10; (11–13) 14–17 We walk by faith, not by sight; in Christ there is a new creation.
- Mark 4:26–34 Jesus uses parables about seeds to describe the kingdom of God

MUSIC NOTES

This morning's **opening voluntary** was written by German composer Johann Ernst Eberlin, whose works bridge Baroque and Classical eras. A prolific composer in many genres including theater and church, he is most known for his organ compositions. "Pars Secunda" is written in fugue form beginning with a single melody then successively taken up by others and developed by interweaving the parts.

Today's vocal offerings consist of various prayerful texts from across the centuries. Our **introit**, a short prayer for stronger faith from the 17th century, is set in a polyphonic texture (multiple lines moving at once) and is sung one voice per part to maintain clarity of the text, both common features of Renaissance choral writing. While the short anthem sounds in a minor sonority, the final chord is major, a compositional technique signifying resolution that carries into the Baroque period.

Another selection from Rutter's extensive canon, today's **anthem** is a beautiful *a cappella* setting of a 19th-century

hymn text that offers a prayer of protection from our watchful shepherd. A soloist sings the melody first, then is joined gradually by voices until the entire ensemble sings together. Using a mixture of sung text and neutral vowels (hums, oo's, etc), Rutter paints each stanza with a different vocal color before the soloist returns to repeat the first stanza at the anthem's close. For our final sung prayer, we offer César Franck's familiar setting of *Panis angelicus* ("bread of angels") as today's **offertory**.

Today's **closing voluntary** demonstrates how improvisations were written as chorales. The first line is played as a solo then imitated in other voicings over a sustained pedal note. German composer and Baroque organist Johann Christoph Bach (1642–1703) was an older cousin of Johann Sebastian Bach and described as a "profound composer".

LEARN ABOUT THE ST. PHILIP DAY SCHOOL—The St. Philip Day School is a new mission initiative on our campus benefitting families lacking access to quality early childhood education. The school will operate on the first floor of our Education Building. The Session approved the plan in May and also authorized start-up funding for the project from our Central Mission Endowment Fund. MISSION ACTIVITIES

CCSC NON-PERISHABLE FOOD DRIVE DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE — During the month of June, the Mission Committee will be collecting non-perishable food donations for drop off at the Gathering Area mission table or at the Church Office. Examples of the different kinds of foods you can drop off include dry beans (1 or 2 pound bags), hearty soups, dry rice (1 or 2 pound bags), canned tuna or chicken, peanut butter, boxed dry cereal, pasta sauce, baby food or formula, toilet paper, canned fruit (all types), canned vegetables (all types), dry pasta and mac and cheese. Food donations continue through June 30. The food is especially needed in the summer months because children are out of school and their families must provided by the school.

REGISTER NOW! KIDS MEALS' PACKING - St. Philip mission partner Kids' Meals will host a group from St. Philip on Monday, July 8, from 12:30 - 2:30 p.m., to help prepare sack lunches for children at home during summer vacation. The mission of Kids' Meals is to end childhood hunger by delivering free, healthy meals, yearround to the doorsteps of the greater Houston area's hungriest preschool-aged children and through collaboration provide their families with resources to help end the cycle of poverty. Over the past 17 years, Kids' Meals has provided more than 14 million free, healthy meals to Houston's hungriest children. In 2024, Kids' Meals will make and deliver at least 2.77 million healthy meals, provide healthy produce and groceries at least three times per week, and leverage their daily access to connect children and families with wrap-around services from more than 70 partner service organizations. Kids' Meals cannot reach these goals without volunteers. St. Philip grants support the Healthy Meal Delivery Program. Please save the date to volunteer at Kids' Meals on **July 8**. This very accessible sung prayer was created by the director of children's ministry at the National Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC, for use by their children's choir, but it is suitable for people of all ages. The familiar tune makes it easy to learn and to memorize.
