



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MUSIC NOTES

The American Negro Spiritual Tradition

While it can likely be said that all sacred songs are generally spiritual in nature, the spirituals of Black American culture make one of the strongest and most unique statements of faith in the entire American song tradition. Indeed, the African American spiritual (also called the Negro Spiritual) constitutes one of the largest and most significant forms of American folksong. The texts of these songs reveal the simplicity and very personal nature of the spiritual. They speak of joy, faith, heaven, struggle, and a deep longing for freedom and peace. Spirituals are most closely associated with the enslavement of African people in the American South between 1619 and 1865. The songs proliferated most in the last few decades of the eighteenth century leading up to the abolishment of legalized slavery in the 1860s. While the songs were born out of this very dark period in American history, these songs are now sung, celebrated, and revered all around the world.* The music in today's service represents but a tiny, tiny sampling of the enduring melodies and texts from what is truly a remarkable body of traditional song literature.

Born of incalculable suffering, the history of the American Negro Spiritual is nevertheless at once rich, moving, and filled with great hope and promise. Some sources for more background and information may be found here:

Piano Music

This morning's **opening voluntary** sets the tone for our celebration of Juneteenth with an arrangement by American composer John Carter of the lively spiritual Ain-a That Good News! Published in 1990, Carter's setting features the traditional spiritual melody in various octaves accompanied by vivid harmonies in syncopated rhythms idiomatic of the Black spiritual tradition. Arranger John Carter was educated at Trinity University in San Antonio and Peabody College in Nashville. Over the course of a long and productive career, he taught in public schools in Ohio and was on the faculty at Morehead State University in Kentucky in addition to serving as a church musician in Presbyterian, Methodist, American Baptist, and United Church of Christ congregations. Now retired, his works include a large body of sacred and

secular choral compositions, over sixty collections of piano works featuring settings of hymns, carols and spirituals, and more recently original compositions for piano.

Choral Music

Today's **anthem** *Steal Away* is the result of a yearslong musical collaboration between pianist and conductor Patrick Dupré Quigley and American countertenor Reginald Mobley. The piece marries the traditional African American spiritual melody of *Steal Away* with a quasi-improvisational ostinato accompaniment that defies resolution until the final notes of the piece. The work was premiered in August 2010 by Mobley with arranger Quigley at the piano. Quigley holds degrees from the University of Notre Dame and the Yale School of Music, and he is the founder and director of Miamibased Seraphic Fire, an ensemble dedicated to the concert performance of the breadth of history's musical works for the human voice.

Concluding this morning's service in the form of a **choral benediction**, the spiritual *There Is More Love Somewhere* reminds us that our work toward racial equality, justice, true liberty and full inclusion is not yet done. Like so many spirituals, it is a song both of lament and of aspiration. American composer Nicholas Palmer's simple arrangement lays bare the incredible power of the spiritual genre as a whole. Palmer serves as director of music for St. John's Episcopal Church in Grand Haven, Michigan and teaches music theory, piano, and choir at Muskegon Community College.

Vocal Solo

Today's **offertory solo** is the rousing spiritual My Good Lord's Done Been Here in an arrangement by Moses Hogan, who was an American pianist, conductor and arranger of international renown. Hogan was educated at Oberlin Conservatory of Music and Juilliard, with subsequent classical music studies in Vienna. During his piano performance years, Hogan won several competitions including first place at the 28th Annual Kosciuszko Foundation Chopin Competition in New York. In 1993 he founded the Moses Hogan Chorale, and in 1997 he formed the Moses Hogan Singers. Near the end of his brief life, Hogan served as editor of, and a contributor to, The Oxford Book of Spirituals (2002), a highly influential choral collection now used by choirs and ensembles throughout the world.

Like many African American spirituals, this one mixes the language of biblical narrative with veiled but effective allusions to the hope of escape from slavery, either by crossing rivers into free states or by participating in organized efforts like the Underground Railroad.



In the King James Version, the promise of "peace like a river" is twice mentioned in Isaiah (48:18; 66:12) as a blessing that comes from doing God's will. The water imagery of this African American spiritual also provides reminders of Christians' baptismal identity.



The description of the Son of Man as standing at the door and knocking (Revelation 3:20) has given rise to many visual and verbal representations of that figure. This African American spiritual uses its repeated phrases to imitate knocking and to give immediacy to this encounter.



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
