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MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

American composer David Conte is Professor of Composition at the San Francisco Conservatory, where he has taught since 1985. His music has been performed and recorded by Chanticleer, the San Francisco Symphony Chorus and other major organizations. His catalogue of organ music includes this morning's *Soliloquy*, commissioned as part of the 1996 celebration of Walter Holtkamp Jr's fortieth year as an organ builder. As its name suggests, this is an expository solo work, with a calm and deliberate beginning, an engaging and even impassioned central argument, and a return to the quiet mood of the opening.

As its name suggests, Handel's *Water Music* was the result of a 1717 request for music to be played on a river barge, as George I of England sailed up and down the Thames from Whitehall to Chelsea. The King apparently needed a spectacle to remind his subjects that he was still relevant, in the face of competition in the cultural sphere from his own son, the Prince of Wales. Among the many movements Handel wrote for this occasion is a "hornpipe," a kind of folk dance long popular in Britain and Ireland. Such pieces, often set in 3/2 time, have a pronounced "swing," the result of well-placed syncopations.

Choral Music

This morning's **anthem** is by British composer John Rutter, who has enjoyed a very long and distinguished career writing and conducting mostly sacred choral music. *A Gaelic Blessing* was published in 1978 for SATB voices and organ, commissioned by the choir of First United Methodist Church in Omaha, Nebraska.

Today's **offertory anthem** is perhaps Rutter's best known and most beloved composition. *The Lord Bless You and Keep You* was published in 1981 for SATB voices and organ, and like *A Gaelic Blessing* above, it now exists in a number of different arrangements for varying combinations of voice parts, as well as various instrumental accompaniments in addition to the original organ parts.

The St. Philip Choir closes its 2022-2023 season today with these favorite anthems. We're looking forward to a bit of a summer break, but we'll be back! To all who have given of their time and talents in service to the choir's ministry this year, and to those who have joined us these last few weeks for a taste of singing from the loft, you have helped us all this year to worship fully and joyfully — thank you!
