Vierne also published two modest collections of pieces "in free style." His 24 Pièces en style libre, as he notes in the volume's preface, are appropriate for church use on either an organ or a harmonium. This collection's boisterous Carillon is based on the pattern of a bell peal at the Chapel of Longpont, a famous abbey just outside of Par-

American composer Mark Miller has a reputation for writing genuine and personally expressive music, and today's anthem is no exception. MISSION ACTIVITIES

CCSC NON-PERISHABLE FOOD DRIVE DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE—During the month of June, the Mission Committee will be collecting non-perishable food donations for drop off at the Gathering Area mission table or at the Church Office. Examples of the different kinds of foods you can drop off include dry beans (1 or 2 pound bags), hearty soups, dry rice (1 or 2 pound bags), canned tuna or chicken, peanut butter, boxed dry cereal, pasta sauce, baby food or formula, toilet paper, canned fruit (all types), canned vegetables (all types), dry pasta and mac and cheese. Food donations continue through June 30. The food is especially needed in the summer months because children are out of school and their families must provide their breakfast and lunch, which are usually provided by the school.


