

Have you ever looked at the effects of climate change and the apathy of so many Christians around you and wondered, "What are we missing here?" Why has the U.S church struggled so mightily to understand the climate crisis as a moral and gospel issue, and instead so often abandoned it to the domain of the culture wars? In these lectures, we will trace some of the historical reasons for the U.S. church's lukewarm engagement with climate change, explore how Scripture might be able to guide us toward a more faithful way forward, and plot out an active and hopeful path for the church as we all strive to follow Jesus more closely in a warming world.

Rev. Kyle Meyaard-Schaap serves as the Vice President of the Evangelical Environmental Network. He holds an undergraduate degree in religious studies from Calvin University (B.A. '12), a Master of Divinity degree from Western Theological Seminary (M.Div. '16), and is ordained in the Christian Reformed Church in North America (CRCNA). For the last eleven years, he has educated and mobilized Christians around the world to address the climate crisis as an act of discipleship and neighbor-love.

MUSIC NOTES

Organ Music

Bach's Prelude and Fugue in C Major, BWV 545, begins with one of the most concise of his organ preludes. Not that this prelude lacks ambition: its opening bar has a surprisingly large reach, from top to bottom "C" of the organ compass, and its figuration radiates joy. The simple but purposeful fugue subject moves slowly up a fourth only to turn back on itself with a quicker flourish, inviting each voice in turn to join in the fun.

Vocal Music

This morning's **first solo** is by American composer Karen Marrolli, who serves as Director of Music Ministries at Central United Methodist Church in Albuquerque, New Mexico. She holds degrees from Louisiana State University (DMA) and Westminster Choir College (BM and MM). *Be still* was published very

recently in 2020, and is a beautiful, simple setting of familiar, comforting words from Psalm 46.

Today's **offertory solo** features the early-American shape-note hymn REDEEMING GRACE, which first appeared in print in *The Southern Harmony* in 1854. The 1989 setting heard this morning is by American composer K. (Kayron) Lee Scott, who taught at the University of Alabama School of Music, the University of Alabama at Birmingham Department of Music, and the Samford University School of Music. Scott's own hymn tunes are published in a wide variety of contemporary American hymnals, including our own *Glory to God* — see No. 226.

This paraphrase and expansion of Matthew 11:28–30 by a Canadian minister is structured so that the first three syllables of each stanza provide the hymn's skeleton and summary. The immediacy of the text is enhanced by the folksong-like setting later composed for it.

This text was written by an Irish-born immigrant to Canada to comfort his mother in Ireland when she was going through a time of special sorrow. The role of prayer as a source of strength and consolation is underscored by its repeated use as a rhyme word in all three stanzas.
