

WORSHIP NOTES

Today's Lectionary readings:

- Isaiah 5:1-7 My vineyard has yielded wild grapes; now I will break down its wall.
- Psalm 80:1-2, 8-19 Have regard for the vine you planted, O Lord; save and restore us!

MUSIC NOTES

C. P. E Bach wrote his organ sonatas in the 1750s for Princess Amalie of Prussia, Frederick the Great's sister, who was an accomplished keyboard player and organist and a key collector of musical manuscripts. The **F** major Sonata Wq. 70/3, fourth in a set of six, is typical of the fashionable *galant* style of composition that was the rage in mid-century Berlin especially. It neatly embodies the two dominant moods common to much of Emanuel Bach's keyboard music: an irrepressible sense of joy with occasional moments of introspection. Its opening and closing movements serve today as our opening and closing voluntaries, respectively.

American composer and conductor René Clausen is known for his dramatic and sensitive approach to text setting, a trait embodied in our short **introit**. From the start of the piece, the choir sings joyful passages together hom0phonically (in the same rhythm) and antiphonally between high and low voices, with dancing rhythmic style and unpredictable shifts in harmony. As distinguished professor at Concordia College in Moorehead, Minnesota, Clausen frequently writes for and directs the Concordia Choir, which has performed and recorded many of his works.

Rooted in John 14, "If ye love me" is most often associated with the ubiquitous musical setting by Thomas Tallis (1565), and remains one of the most recognizable Biblical passages from the English Reformation. In the original text, Jesus speaks to his disciples of his impending death and promises that if they follow his commandments, God the Father will send a "Comforter" in the Holy Spirit. Unlike Tallis' unaccompanied version, present-day English composer Philip Wilby uses the fullness of the organ to support a musical narrative of the text: a booming solo voice representing Jesus and the choir portraying the mysterious Holy Spirit as an evolving sequence of choral suspensions.

A younger contemporary of Vivaldi, Benedetto Marcello was similarly prolific, composing a considerable amount of church music, oratorios, cantatas, and many instrumental works with a Vivaldian flair. Our **offertory**, a duet in the typically joyful key of D major, is a translation and adaptation of Psalm 13:6 "I will sing the Lord's praise, for he has been good to me." Marcello's 50 Psalm settings—written in multiple volumes—employ a mix of voicings of choir and soloists, all of which are accompanied by basso continuo.



ENNEAGRAM-NEW SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASS

In September we will begin a new church school class on the Enneagram. You may wonder what that is, and why we are offering this class at St. Philip. The Enneagram is a "power tool" for self-awareness, compassion, leadership and personal development. But the Enneagram is old. It has roots in several wisdom traditions, including Christianity, Judaism, and Islam. Seven of the nine Enneagram types are associated with the "capital" or "deadly" sins which originated with the Desert Fathers. It was used in monastic circles as a guide for spiritual direction. But today it is taught as a system of looking at nine distinct human personality patterns.

Rev. Holly Heuer, who worships here at St. Philip will be teaching the class. She is a certified instructor and has taught the Enneagram widely in church settings. She uses the Enneagram in her spiritual direction practice and constantly in her daily life. She believes that it is one of the best maps for knowing ourselves and moving towards our greatest potential.

The aim of the class is to develop self-awareness and self-knowledge through the practice of presence. That is, being aware in each moment of the presence of God. No prior experience is necessary, only a willing and curious spirit. If you think you might attend the class, Holly will share a bibliography of online resources, so that you can get acquainted with the Enneagram. Guitar chords do not correspond with keyboard harmony.

The doubled lines in each stanza of this reflection on Christ's birth and death echo his saying (Luke 19:40) that creation will praise him if people are silent. This text by a former Poet Laureate of the United States is set to a lullaby-like tune specially composed for it.
