MUSIC NOTES

Jean Langlais, longtime organist titulaire at the Basilica of Sainte-Clotilde on Paris's Left Bank, left a large body of organ music that is highly varied in nature and quality. The "Pasticcio" from his 1956 *Organ Book* combines fanfare motives with more subdued material for a brief but festive musical "main dish." (In Italian a "pasticcio" is a baked meat pie.) His *Suite Brève* ("Short Suite") includes a perky "Dialogue" on the mixture stops, which refer to ranks of small pipes whose combination adds brilliance to the ensemble. Among other compositional devices, Langlais delighted in musical surprises, and this piece offers more than a few.

Charles Callahan, an accomplished organist, composer, and conductor, was a native of New England whose compositions reflect a lifelong devotion to liturgical music. Given his experience studying at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia, and as organist in the Anglican and Catholic church, Callahan's style occupies an appropriate space between more modal Anglican style and modern American tonality. Today's **introit** displays Callahan's economical use of musical ideas, as well as his gentle lyricism.

Our anthem today is the premiere of a musical tribute of a long friendship between two members of the St. Philip choir. Jan Fox and Jeanie Flowers first met in the choir decades ago, and over the years have developed an enduring relationship that radiates to everyone around them. **Humble Servant**, a reflection of Jeanie's faith and love of music, was the result of Jan's desire to honor her friend's milestone birthday and the bond they share. The piece itself includes several personal connections to Jeanie, such as a soprano solo sung by Jan's daughter Julia, Jeanie's granddaughter Caroline playing the same two handbells that Jeanie played as part of the St. Philip handbell ensemble, and a text that reflects Jeanie's deep dedication to her church.

Mendelssohn's massive work *Elijah*, which will celebrate its 180th anniversary in 2026, tells the story of the prophet Elijah and the evolution of the Jewish faith from worship of Babylonian idols to worshiping a monotheistic God. Sung by a solo soprano, "Hear ye, Israel!" opens the second half of the oratorio in a reassuring fashion before the story quickly escalates as Elijah confronts King Ahab about angering God by worshiping the god Baal. Although Elijah remains one of Mendelssohn's best-known works, its massive scale and rigorous demands to prepare the work for publication ultimately proved too much for him, contributing to a series of strokes and an early death at the early age of 38.



The original French text, sometimes attributed to John Calvin, seems to be a Protestant reworking of a Roman Catholic hymn, not a typical practice for him. Yet this text and tune (adapted from GENEVAN 124) clearly date from the early years of the Reformed tradition.




Guitar chords do not correspond with keyboard harmony.

The effectiveness of this paraphrase of Psalm 139:1–12, 23–24 partly derives from its imitation of the characteristic repetitions that give emotional intensity to Hebrew poetry. Such patterns of repetitiveness can also be seen in the last three notes of each phrase of the tune.

This text was inspired by how the prophet Hosea describes the parental nature of God's relationship with Israel (Hosea 11:1–19). The last stanza echoes Christ's teachings about love of neighbor (Matthew 22:37–40/Mark 12:29–31) and care for "the least of these" (Matthew 25:31–46).

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
