MUSIC NOTES

The Thuringian organist Johann Gottfried Vierling, born in the year that Bach died, followed a similar career path as his illustrious fellow Thuringian: as a church composer. His works retain some of the contrapuntal wizardry of the late Baroque Lutherans while exhibiting a more tuneful, easygoing style, evident from a short **Trio and Allegro in C Major**. Its early classical musical language is utterly *gemütlich*, "Biedermeier" in its casual yet refined take on the everyday.

Today's vocal selections, all drawn from the mid-19th century, encapsulate the capability of composers in that time to create a depth of expression in their musical settings using relatively small amounts of text.

Samuel Sebastian Wesley was an English organist and composer who comes from good stock for sacred music. The grandson of the founder of Methodism, Charles Wesley, Samuel was also given his middle name by his father – also Samuel– who had a lifelong admiration for the German composer Johann Sebastian (J.S.) Bach. Today's **introit** is excerpted from the opening of an anthem by Welsey that shows the composer's creative use of harmony and counterpoint in expressing the meaning of the text, a characteristic not unlike his German namesake. Also like Bach, Samuel was often referred to as "S.S." to distinguish from his father.

Based on a Lutheran hymn, Mendelssohn's *Verleih uns Frieden* ("Grant us peace") was composed as a short, one-movement work for choir and orchestra in 1831 and has since become a favorite amongst choral ensembles around the world. A paraphrase of *Da pacem Domine*, the Latin prayer for peace from the 6th or 7th

century, the text assures us that, "though feeble and frail," we find safety in the Lord, "Thou Source of every blessing." The text is paired with an expressive melody that is presented in three different ways: first, by tenors and basses, then as a dialogue between treble and bass voices, and finally in a mostly homophonic (melody sung in harmony) four-voice chorale that emanates peacefulness and assurance.

Charles-Camille Saint-Saëns was an international figure and prolific composer whose output spans the keyboard, vocal, orchestral, operatic, and sacred music realms. Inspired by a short paraphrase of Psalm 19, our **offertory** today is an expressive duet between a soprano solo and a contrapuntal melodic line originally written for cello. Saint-Saëns has long been a fixture in classical music programs with works such as his Cello Concerto, *Carnival of the Animals*, and epic Organ Symphony, but he also remains popular through the inclusion of his music in popular culture (think *Danse macabre* in countless Halloween movies and TV shows or *The Swan* played by Yo-Yo Ma).

The 17th-century French organist Louis Couperin composed distinct repertoires for the harpsichord and the organ. A few pieces make the transfer from one instrument to the other well, including a **Chaconne in G minor**, which relies on a repeating refrain and intervening couplets (brief wordless "verses"). More than 200 years later, another French organist by the name of Joseph Bonnet took Couperin's spare Chaconne and fleshed it out in a grandiose arrangement for organ, in which guise it closes today's service.



Christ, Whose Glory Fills the Skies

RATISBON



This well-crafted morning hymn opens by celebrating daylight as an image of Christ, the true Light, then ponders life without light, and culminates in a prayer for inward light. The tune's name honors its German roots: Ratisbon is the former English name for Regensburg.

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The scriptural basis of this text is Romans 15:7, recast as a prayer in the opening two lines of the first stanza. The many implications of living as people who have been accepted by Christ fill the remaining stanzas. This tune was composed for the first publication of this text.
