MUSIC NOTES

Blessed with a prodigious musical memory, John Stanley enjoyed a long and productive career in the field despite a childhood accident that left him nearly blind. A student of Maurice Green, he became organist at London's fashionable Temple Church at the age of twenty-two and remained in this position for some fifty years. Enthusiasts came from around the capital on Sundays to hear him play, including his good friend George Frideric Handel. A gifted violinist and keyboard player, Stanley published in 1775 a collection of concertos (Op. 10) for either solo harpsichord or organ. Like several others in the volume, the C-minor Concerto begins with a substantial ritornello-type opening movement, which is today's **opening voluntary**.

We are thrilled to welcome our handbell ensemble back to worship after a well-deserved summer break. To-day's **introit** features an original work by Jason Krug, a prolific composer of modern music for handbells, that consists of a continuous rhythmic figure and a mysterious melodic tune. Almost hiding from full view, the tune is passed between the various ranges and textures of the ensemble until the end when it appears in the highest pitched bells.

Over his long career, organist and composer John Ferguson has become synonymous with hymnody. Not only have his creative arrangements of many different hymn tunes given a new enthusiasm to choral and congregational hymn singing around the world, but he has also led hymn festivals every year around the world for gatherings of organists, choral conductors, and church musicians. Our **anthem** today pairs an American hymn tune from the early 20th century and text that celebrates the natural harmony between all God's creations.

Originally a revivalist song by Georgia farmer John McCurry, Zion's Walls is a typical example of something that would have been sung at camp meetings or "revivals" in rural Georgia, which were annual affairs of invigorated spiritual renewal, but also celebrated crop harvest and offered a reprieve from routine farm life. Over a century later, Copland included his own version in the second of two volumes of Old American Songs (1952), bringing the joyous nature of the 19thcentury revivals to the fore through music that moves with anticipation and excitement. Composed in the aftermath of the second World War and the beginning of the Cold War, the innocent settings of American tunes contained in both volumes of songs can also be heard with a hint of Copland's nostalgia for a happier and more peaceful time in America.

Though he wrote nothing else for the instrument, Mozart composed three works for an "organ clock," a contraption that played itself by means of a pinned barrel. The historical precursor to the calliope, the organ clock got about as much respect: Mozart himself disparaged the instrument, describing its high-pitched sounds as "childish." And yet, the pieces he created for these sophisticated machines possess both drama and charm and no small amount of musical creativity. His Adagio and Allegro in F Minor (K. 594) is additionally a piece of Trauermusik, a work that originally mourned the loss of an Austrian Field Marshal. Commissioned for a peculiar museum (think Madame Tussauds decked out with mechanical music boxes), K. 594 played on the hour next to a glass casket, in which a wax figure of the deceased lay in repose. The vigorous central Allegro from this tripartite work is today's **closing voluntary**.





DAVID LAMOTTE CONCERT

David LaMotte is a songwriter, speaker, and author who is a frequent speaker and retreat leader at Montreat, Mo Ranch, and other Presbyterian gatherings. He has performed over 3,500 concerts and released thirteen full-length CDs of primarily original music, touring in all of the fifty states and on five of the seven continents. The *Boston Globe* writes that his music "pushes the envelope with challenging lyrics and unusual tunings, but he also pays homage to folk tradition," while *BBC Radio Belfast* lauds his "charm, stories, humour, insightful songs, sweet voice and dazzling guitar ability." His most recent album, *Still*, features the number one song on Folk Radio in September 2022 (*September Me*), and the album remained in the top twenty for six months.

In 2008, David pursued his vocation of peacemaking further when he accepted a Rotary World Peace Fellowship to study International Relations, Peace and Conflict Resolution at the University of Queensland in Brisbane, Australia. On St. Philip youth's first Spiritual Pilgrimage for Racial Justice, David met with us in Montreat to teach youth about Rosa Parks and her story as an example of why successful social movements are rooted in a "movement narrative" rather than a "hero narrative."

David is the son, grandson, and brother of Presbyterian ministers, and the fourth of four kids. He has also lived for short times in Raleigh, NC, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, Paris, France, rural Andhra Pradesh, India, and Brisbane, Australia, but has made his home for more than thirty years in Black Mountain, North Carolina, where he currently resides with his wife, son, old dog, and five chickens.







This stirring hymn used at the opening of Riverside Church in New York in 1930 was penned by its widely-known and influential pastor, and it has gained a firm place in English-language hymnals around the world. The Welsh tune name honors the Rhondda Valley in Glamorganshire.
